




National Greater Sage-Grouse Planning Strategy

Northeast California Surprise Field Office Grazing Allotments



Grazing allotments are displayed for the Surprise Field Office. Boundaries may be fences, arbitrary lines, or natural barriers. Grazing can have localized effects on greater sage-grouse habitat depending on the condition of the habitat and the grazing practices used. Depending

on design and application, grazing practices can also be used as a tool to protect intact sagebrush habitat and increase habitat extent and continuity, which is beneficial to greater sage-grouse and its habitat.
