Notice of Field Manager's Decision

Dear Mr. Duelke:

I have received your request for a temporary crossing permit to trail livestock across public lands in the following allotments: North Balanced Rock (#1139), Devil Creek Balanced Rock (#1133), Noh Field (#1140), Coonskin AMP (#1123), Echo Luby (#0283), Echo 4 (#0296), and Echo 5 (#0282). Upon review, and in accordance with 43 CFR 4130.6-3, 43 CFR 4160.1(a) and Section 123 of the 2012 Appropriations Omnibus Act, your application for a temporary crossing permit is approved, with conditions.

Background

Your crossing permit application requested authorization to trail two bands of 1200 sheep through the North Balanced Rock (#1139), Devil Creek Balanced Rock (#1133), Noh Field (#1140), Coonskin AMP (#1123), Echo Luby (#0283), Echo 4 (#0296), and Echo 5 (#0282) Allotments to the Echo Hammett Livestock (#0342) Allotment. Trailing activities are scheduled to occur for 7 days for each band between March 15 and April 15, 2013, depending on weather conditions. The BLM prepared Environmental Assessment (EA) No. DOI-BLM-ID-T010-2012-0004-EA¹ to analyze the environmental consequences of trailing livestock throughout the Jarbidge Field Office. After reviewing EA No. DOI-BLM-ID-T010-2012-0004-EA, I determined that livestock trailing would not result in any significant impacts and issued a Finding of No Significant Impact on November 16, 2012.

Decision

I have decided to issue you a crossing permit to trail two bands of 1200 sheep across public lands. The authorized trailing route will cross through portions of the North Balanced Rock (#1139), Devil Creek Balanced Rock (#1133), Noh Field (#1140), Coonskin AMP (#1123), Echo Luby (#0283), Echo 4 (#0296), and Echo 5 (#0282) Allotments along a trailing route (see attached map) analyzed under Alternative 2 of EA No. DOI-BLM-ID-T010-2012-0004-EA. As described in the Finding of No Significant Impact for the EA, I found none of the impacts associated with this trailing event to be significant either individually or cumulatively. Therefore, you are authorized to conduct crossing activities for up to 7 days for each band of sheep between March 15 and April 15, 2013 in accordance with the terms and conditions listed in the attached permit. My reasons for approving your application with the additional terms and conditions are to minimize potential impacts to soils, wildlife habitat, slickspot peppergrass, cultural resources, and noxious weeds and invasive plants.

My decision is in conformance with the 1987 Jarbidge Resource Management Plan (RMP). The RMP authorizes livestock grazing within the grazing allotments of the Jarbidge Field Office. Livestock trailing is an action connected to livestock grazing management and, therefore, trailing is in conformance with the RMP. This action would not result in a change in the scope of resource use or a change in the terms, conditions, and decision of the approved RMP.

BLM analyzed four alternatives (Proposed Action and Alternatives 1-3) and considered one additional alternative that was not analyzed in detail (see Chapter 2 of EA No. DOI-BLM-ID-T010-2012-0004-EA). The Proposed Action included the proposed trailing activities as submitted in crossing permit applications. Alternative 1 was the no action alternative and would have denied all applications for crossing permits. Alternative 2 established 1-mile wide trailing corridors across the Jarbidge Field Office. Alternative 3 was developed in response to public comments and reduced the trailing corridor width and locations across the Jarbidge Field Office.

All terms and conditions described in the temporary crossing permit are incorporated by reference into this decision and must be followed. Terms and conditions that are specifically identified to reduce environmental effects are:

Terms and Conditions

- Trailing will occur along the route outlined on the attached map. Overnighting will occur in the areas shown on the attached map.
- Livestock trailing will be routed at least 0.62 mile from occupied sage-grouse leks.
- Bedding and over-night areas will be located at least 0.62 mile from occupied sage-grouse leks.
- Trailing will not be authorized during times when soils are saturated. Environmental conditions will be monitored for trailing within high potential slickspot peppergrass habitat to ensure trailing does not occur during times of saturated soils. Livestock trailing in potential slickspot peppergrass habitat will occur on roadways/designated routes of travel when practical.

- The authorized trail route has been modified to reduce the distance livestock would trail across burned areas. The authorized trail route avoids recent vegetation treatments.
- The use of certified noxious-weed-free forage will be required for any horses used for the herding of livestock.
- Bedding areas, temporary watering facilities, and trailing related camping areas will be at least 0.25 mile from canyon rims.
- Bedding areas, temporary watering facilities, and trailing related camping areas will be at least 0.25 mile from the Toana Freight Wagon Road. Crossing of this historic trail will be restricted to pre-determined locations (see attached map).
- Livestock trailing routes will occur on roadways/designated routes of travel when practical.
- Use of motorized vehicles associated with trailing is restricted to existing roads.

The temporary crossing permit will be signed by the applicant and the Jarbidge Field Manager, or his authorized representative, prior to the trailing event.

Rationale

Authorizing the trailing of livestock across BLM-administered lands would facilitate proper grazing management of BLM grazing allotments; as well as facilitate movements of livestock to and from private, state, or other federally administered lands. Issuance of the crossing permit authorizing the trailing of livestock across BLM-administered lands is in accordance with 43 CFR 4130 and 4160, and is consistent with the provisions of the Taylor Grazing Act and the Federal Land Policy and Management Act.

The authorized trailing route and overnight areas avoid sagebrush habitats, riparian areas, occupied pygmy rabbit habitat, occupied golden eagle nests, ferruginous hawk nests, and recent vegetation treatments.

Sage-grouse could be disturbed by livestock trailing activities during the breeding and nesting seasons. However, the authorized trail route and overnight areas are more than 0.62 miles away from all occupied sage-grouse leks and no key sage-grouse habitat occurs within the authorized trail route.

California bighorn sheep could be affected by livestock trailing through disturbance or potential disease transmission. Disease transmission could occur if wild bighorn sheep contact infected domestic sheep. However, the authorized trail route is more than 9 miles from year-round bighorn sheep habitat, reducing the potential risk of disease transmission.

Livestock trailing activities could affect potential slickspot peppergrass habitat through trampling or introduction of nonnative invasive species to slickspots. However, by not authorizing livestock trailing within occupied slickspot peppergrass Element Occurrences, avoiding livestock trailing in potential habitat when soils are saturated, and restricting the majority of trailing activities to existing roads, potential effects to slickspot peppergrass would be reduced.

Areas recently burned by wildfires could be more susceptible to erosion and disturbance caused by livestock trampling. However, potential effects would be minimized by trailing on existing roads when and where practical. Furthermore, the authorized trail route has been modified to reduce the distance livestock would be trailed across burned areas.

Cultural resource inventories have been conducted along these routes with special attention given to concentration areas, such as overnight areas.

The authorized trail route utilizes existing roads and trails to the maximum extent possible.

Authority

My decision is issued under the authority found in:

Title 43 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Subpart 4100 Grazing Administration, specifically sections 4100.0-3, 4130.6-3, 4130.3, 4160.3(a), 4130.8-1(b), and 4130.8-1(c);

the 2012 Appropriations Omnibus Act Sec. 123; and

the 1987 Jarbidge Resource Management Plan which allocates livestock uses in the affected allotments.

Protest and/or Appeal

My decision is not subject to protest or appeal in accordance with Section 123 of the 2012 Appropriations Omnibus Act.



OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- Livestock trailing will be in accordance with the Notice of Field Manager's Decision dated March 1, 2013.
- Dates may vary based on weather and soil conditions. The Field Manager or his authorized representative shall be notified prior to any changes in the schedule.
- Trailing will occur along the route outlined on the attached map. Overnighting will occur in the areas shown on the attached map.
- Livestock trailing will be routed at least 0.62 mile from occupied sage-grouse leks.
- Bedding and over-night areas will be located at least 0.62 mile from occupied sage-grouse leks.
- Trailing will not be authorized during times when soils are saturated. Environmental conditions will be monitored for trailing within high potential slickspot peppergrass habitat to ensure trailing does not occur during times of saturated soils. Livestock trailing in potential slickspot peppergrass habitat will occur on roadways/designated routes of travel when practical.

This permit: 1. Conveys no right, title or interest held by the United States in any lands or resources and 2. is subject to (A) modification, suspension or cancellation as provided by land plans and applicable law; (B) review and modification of terms and conditions as appropriate; and (C) the Taylor Grazing Act, as amended, the Federal Land Policy and Management Act, as amended, the Public Rangelands Improvement Act, and the rules and regulations now or hereafter promulgated thereunder by the Secretary of the Interior.

- The authorized trail route has been modified to reduce the distance livestock would trail across burned areas. The authorized trail route avoids recent vegetation treatments.
- The use of certified noxious-weed-free forage will be required for any horses used for the herding of livestock.
- Bedding areas, temporary watering facilities, and trailing related camping areas will be at least 0.25 mile from canyon rims.
- Bedding areas, temporary watering facilities, and trailing related camping areas will be at least 0.25 mile from the Toana Freight Wagon Road. Crossing of this historic trail will be restricted to pre-determined locations (see attached map).
- Livestock trailing routes will occur on roadways/designated routes of travel when practical.
- Use of motorized vehicles associated with trailing is restricted to existing roads.

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- Billing notices are issued which specify fees due. Billing notices, when paid, become part of the crossing permit. Fee payments are due on the date specified on the billing notice and **MUST** be paid in full prior to livestock crossing activities.
- This permit is issued solely for the purpose of moving livestock across public lands for proper and lawful purposes, as needed for the orderly administration of rangelands. This permit confers no priority for renewal, and cannot be transferred or assigned.
- The allotment(s) listed on this crossing permit is subject to requirements 43 CFR 4180 – Fundamentals of Rangeland Health and Standards and Guidelines for Grazing Administration. This permit shall be modified, if necessary, to meet these requirements upon completion of a Standards and Guidelines Assessment and Determination.
