**Desert Raiders Motorcycle Race Special Recreation Permit**

**Purpose and Need for Action:** The Purpose of the action is to provide recreational OHV racing opportunities while protecting important natural and cultural resources. On September 4, 2009, Boise District received an application for a Special Recreation Permit for the Desert Raiders Motorcycle Club to conduct a motorcycle race on BLM lands. The event would be held in the Owyhee Front within an area classified as "limited to existing routes" to motor vehicle use and within an area that has been used for competitive motorcycle races since the 1970's. Special recreation permits may be issued for events to be conducted in the Bruneau Field Office to individuals and organizations that apply in accordance with the BLM Special Recreation Permit Policy (43 CFR 8372).

**Description of Proposed Action:** The proposed event is scheduled for February 20, 2010. It would be approximately a 44 mile course on roads and trails specifically authorized for the event. The routes were selected to minimize or avoid sensitive resources such as known special status plant and animal habitat and cultural resources.

The event route would follow a defined, clearly marked course. The permittee would mark the entire route a maximum of 14 days in advance and would remove the markers within 14 days after the event. Painting rocks and establishing permanent markers and improvements would not be authorized. Race participants would be informed that passing on race courses would be limited to disturbed areas of roads and trails and would not occur in vegetated areas adjacent to the course. When requested, the permittee would place flagging, signs, and barriers sufficient to effectively protect natural and cultural resources as directed by BLM officials, including the marking and enforcement of no passing restrictions or speed limits on course segments specified by BLM. There would be a sufficient number of race officials to enforce compliance with permit stipulations. Warning signs and flaggers would be placed along all affected asphalt and gravel roadways, and competitors would be required to walk their bikes across. Refueling and major servicing of race vehicles would only occur where trails cross roads. The permittee would provide portable toilets, refuse containers, and perform a sweep of the area removing litter once the event is completed. Proper authorities would be notified prior to the event and an emergency services unit would be on-site for the entire race.

*Comments/Explanation:* The Proposed Action would not have any significant impacts to public health or safety. Adequate safety precautions would be implemented to ensure public safety including: race course would be signed and flagged, race officials would be posted throughout the course at major intersections and areas identified as hazardous, local authorities and other permittees would be notified, and a medical unit would be on scene.

*Comments/Explanation:* The proposed route lies outside nationally designated parks, recreation areas, refuges, wilderness areas, wild and scenic river corridors, monuments and national landmarks. There are no unique geographic characteristics or floodplains present. It has been determined that there are no significant cultural and historic resources that need to be avoided. The competitive area is not a sole or principal drinking water aquifer. The competitive area is not prime farmland. The competitive area does not contain wetland habitats. Migratory birds would not be negatively affected by the proposed action.

*Comments/Explanation:* The authorization of this permit would not have highly controversial environmental effects or involve unresolved conflicts concerning alternative uses of available resources. This event would be conducted on existing roads and trails and within an area authorized for motorcycle races. The race routes and timing of event would minimize resource concerns including sensitive plants, wildlife species, and riparian areas; avoid cultural resources, and other uses of this area including grazing of livestock.

*Comments/Explanation:* The event has been reviewed and cleared by resource specialists with knowledge of the area. All motorized activity would take place on existing roads and trails. Repairs and major servicing of race vehicles would only occur at the start/finish area and intersections of roads and trails accessible by vehicles. Refuse containers and restrooms would be provided at the staging area. The Bureau has conducted and monitored many similar events and the potential associated environmental impacts are well known.

<i>Comments/Explanation:</i> Requests for competitive events are evaluated on a case-by-case basis and have been a recognized use in both the 1983 Bruneau MFP and a 1994 Environmental Assessment (ID-01-94111) addressing competitive use in the Owyhee Front. The SRP would be for a one point in time event and would not set a precedent for how the area could be used in the future.

<i>Comments/Explanation:</i> Other human-related activities occurring in the area include livestock grazing and casual recreation use. A recent NEPA analysis on livestock grazing (ID-120-2008-EA-45) addressed cumulative impacts in the area and determined that grazing, in conjunction with casual recreation use and events such as the proposed action, would not have significant impacts on the resources present.

<i>Comments/Explanation:</i> There are no known historic properties within the area of potential effect (APE). For this race the APE is defined as existing trails and washes. One historic site, 100E-1455 in the Bruneau MFP is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The site is between 15-20 feet from a wash that is designated as a trail for this race. The site will not be impacted provided the race participants stay in the wash. The proposal is exempt from inventory and project specific review by ISHPO under the current BLM / ISHPO protocol (1998). Exemption # 20.a. which states "Issuance of recreation special-use permits where the potential to cause ground disturbance or affect historic properties is negligible. Periodic monitoring may be conducted to confirm that effects are negligible. Types of projects include but are not limited to: a. Well-established trails, and other specified areas where use would be similar to previous permits for which environmental documents have been prepared, and which would not substantially increase the level of use or continue unsatisfactory environmental conditions."

<i>Plants- Comments/Explanation:</i> All authorized routes were reviewed by the Botanist/Ecologist and it was determined that the event would not adversely impact any special status plants.		
<i>Wildlife-Comments/Explanation:</i> This area resides within the Owyhee Front and is characterized by Wyoming big sagebrush and shadscale mix shrub communities with varying amounts of cheatgrass. Effects to wildlife from motorcycle racing was assessed in the 1994 Southwest Idaho Desert Racers Association EA and mitigations in that analysis prescribed that race events should occur before March 1 to minimize effects to many wildlife species found in the area (e.g. nesting raptors and other birds). Additionally, reptiles would not be active during the February 20 event so possible impacts to the four BLM Sensitive snakes (3) and lizard (1) would not be incurred. Wintering antelope do occur in the area so temporary displacement may result from the race but ongoing casual motorized use in the area means that antelope have adapted to these types of activities and will not suffer mortalities from the event. See the Special Status Animal Clearance Worksheet for more detailed analyses.		
<i>Aquatics-Comments/Explanation:</i> Authorization of this permit would not result in significant impacts to fish species listed or proposed to be listed on the List of Endangered or Threatened Species. The proposed routes do not support critical habitat for fish species listed under the Endangered Species Act.

<i>Comments/Explanation:</i> The proposed event would not contribute to the introduction, continued existence, or spread of noxious weeds or non-native invasive species known to occur in the area, or actions that may promote the introduction, growth, or expansion of range species. No ground disturbing activities would take place. Motorized travel would be limited to existing roads and trails. Cross country travel would be prohibited.

- (1) The relative harm to the parties if the stay is granted or denied.
- (2) The likelihood of the appellant's success on the merits.
- (3) The likelihood of immediate and irreparable harm if the stay is not granted, and
- (4) Whether public interest favors granting the stay.

All decisions of the authorized officer under 43 CFR 2931.8 shall remain effective pending appeal unless the Secretary rules otherwise. Petitions for stay of decisions shall be filed with the Office of Hearing and Appeals, Department of the Interior.
