Notice of Field Manager's Decision

Dear Mr. Anchustegui:

Your application has been received for a crossing permit (aka livestock trailing permit) to trail livestock across public lands in the following allotments: Black Canyon, Cherry Creek, Cow Creek, Davis Mountain, Home Place, Little Beaver, Little Fish Creek, Macon Flat, and Road Canyon. Upon review, and in accordance with 43 CFR 4130.6-3 and Section 123 of the 2012 Appropriations Omnibus Act, your application for a crossing permit is approved as shown under the Decision section of this document.

Background

In October 2011 and September 2012, the Shoshone Field Office solicited applications for crossing permits for trailing livestock across public lands within the Shoshone Field Office area. In response to applications received, the BLM prepared Environmental Assessment (EA) No. DOI-BLM-ID-T030-2012-0044-EA to analyze the environmental consequences of trailing livestock throughout the Shoshone Field Office for multiple years. After reviewing EA No. DOI-BLM-ID-T030-2012-0044-EA, BLM determined that livestock trailing activities analyzed in the proposed action would not result in any significant impacts and issued a Finding of No Significant Impact on March 25, 2013.

Decision

The decision has been made to issue you a multi-year livestock crossing permit to trail livestock across public lands as described in the Proposed Action of EA No. DOI-BLM-ID-T030-2012-0044-EA. You are authorized to conduct crossing activities in accordance with the attached Crossing Permit.

All terms and conditions described in the crossing permit are incorporated by reference into this decision and must be followed. Terms and conditions that are specifically identified to reduce environmental effects are:

Terms & Conditions:

1. Livestock trailing in Cow Creek, Home Place, Little Beaver, Little Fish Creek and Road Canyon allotments will be limited to one day. No overnighting on BLM-administered lands is permitted without pre-approval of the Authorized Officer.
2. Livestock trailing from Clover Creek headed east to North Gooding, crossing Davis Mountain and Black Canyon will be limited to one day in the spring 4/10 to 4/30 along designated trailing route. The overnight will also be designated at the end of the route next to a county road and will be billed in North Gooding Allotment.
3. Bedding of livestock will not be permitted within 500 feet of riparian areas. If steep terrain or other topographical features do not allow a 500 foot buffer, bedding of livestock would not be permitted immediately adjacent to riparian areas.
4. Livestock trailing along western trail route in the Road Canyon Allotment will be limited to one day trail events only. No overnighting permitted.
5. Livestock Trailing in Black Canyon, Cherry Creek, Davis Mountain and Macon Flat allotments will be limited to two days per trailing event.
6. One day trails through multiple grazing allotments will only be billed in one allotment to avoid duplicate billing. This may lead to some allotments having a zero in the AUM column.

7. In the Macon Flat Allotment:

Livestock trailing will not be permitted to occur off of designated routes to prevent trampling of pygmy rabbit burrows. Bedding or overnighting of livestock will not be permitted to occur on designated areas to prevent disturbance to pygmy rabbits and trampling of pygmy rabbit burrows.

Livestock trailing will not be permitted to occur off of designated roads to prevent disturbance to known raptor nests from February 1 to July 31. Also, bedding of sheep will not be permitted within a half-mile of known raptor nests. Permittees will be notified of current raptor nesting locations annually.

Bedding or overnighting of livestock will not be permitted to occur within 0.6 mile of occupied or undetermined status sage-grouse leks from March 15 to May 1 from 6 pm to 9 am. Allotments north of Highway 20, the timeframe are March 25 to May 15. Permittees will be notified of current sage-grouse lek locations.

Livestock trailing will not be permitted to occur within 0.6 mile of occupied or undetermined status sage-grouse leks from March 15 to May 1 from 6 pm to 9 am except on designated roads. Allotments north of Highway 20, the timeframe are March 25 to May 15. Permittees will be notified of current sage-grouse lek locations.

8. Livestock trailing will occur along the route outlined in the attached map and in accordance with the Authorized Officer's Final Decision.

Rationale

Issuance of the crossing permit is in accordance with 43 CFR 4130.6-3, 43 CFR 4160 and Section 123 of the 2012 Appropriations Omnibus Act. Issuance of this crossing permit conforms to the 1979 Shoshone Grazing Management Plan and the 1981 Sun Valley Grazing Management Plan. This action would not result in a change in the scope of resource use or a change in the terms, conditions, and decisions of the approved plans.

BLM analyzed three alternatives (Proposed Action, Alternative 1 and Alternative 2) and considered two additional alternatives that were not analyzed in detail (see Section 2.5 of EA No. DOI-BLM-ID-T030-2012-0044-EA).

The Proposed Action would issue 27 crossing permits with reduced crossing permit authorization and resource-specific terms and conditions to reduce impacts to resources such as special status species and their habitat, wildlife, cultural sites eligible for the National Register of Historic Places, and Idaho Standards for Rangeland Health.

Alternative 1 would issue 27 crossing permits for all the applications received with no reduced crossing permit authorization and resource-specific terms and conditions.

Alternative 2 is the No Action alternative and would deny all applications for livestock trailing. Crossing Permits would not be authorized in the Shoshone Field Office.

Authority

This decision is issued under the authority found in:

- Title 43 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Subpart 4100 Grazing Administration, specifically sections 4100.0-3, 4130.6-3, 4130.3, 4160.1, 4160.3, and 4130.8-1b;
- the 2012 Appropriations Omnibus Act Sec. 123; and
- the 1979 Shoshone Grazing Management Plan and the 1981 Sun Valley Grazing Management Plan, which allocates livestock uses in the affected allotments.

Protest and/or Appeal

This decision is **not** subject to protest or appeal in accordance with Section 123 of the 2012 Appropriations Omnibus Act.
