### Description of Proposed Action:


The applicant, Nathan Wardwell, with JOA Surveys, has requested authorization for field activity to access and land by helicopter on lands within the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A) in support of the SDMI (Statewide Digital Mapping Initiative).

They will be surveying 7 seven points in the eastern and southern portions of NPR-A. The survey at each point will consist of setting up one static GPS receiver to collect at least two hours of data. The set-up is completely temporary. The longest amount of time that the receiver will be deployed is overnight. Once the receiver has logged at least 2 two hours of data and the field crew can safely return to the site they will remove everything.

The applicant will not establish campsites in the field. They will store a 55 gallon drum of fuel at the airstrip in Umiat. The applicant expects at most two landings per site. The first landing will set up the GPS receiver, and the second landing pick up the receiver after they have collected at least two hours of data.

This project will require two people total for the site visits, the helicopter pilot and the JOA surveyor.

## **B. Land Use Plan Conformance**

The proposed action is in conformance with the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act which allows for the authorization of uses consistent with the purposes of the Act.

IAP: National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska Integrated Activity Plan/Environmental Impact Statement (IAP/EIS).

Date Approved/Amended: November 2012 and associated Record of Decision dated February 2013.

The proposed action is in conformance with the IAP, even though it is not specifically provided for, because it is clearly consistent with the following IAP decision (including objectives, terms, and conditions): The stipulations and best management practices will regulate permitted activities to meet resources and use objectives and thereby mitigate impacts of those activities.

## **C. Compliance with NEPA:**

The Proposed Action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 2, Appendix 1, or 516 DM 11.9. Specifically the proposed action meets the criteria for a categorical exclusion under 516 DM 11.9, BLM H-1790-1 National Environmental Policy Act Handbook Appendix 4 (F-10) BLM Categorical Exclusions.

**“Nondestructive data collection, inventory (including field, aerial, and satellite surveying and mapping), study, research, and monitoring activities.”**

The Proposed Action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 2, Appendix 1, or 516 DM 11.9. Specifically the proposed action meets the criteria for a categorical exclusion under 516 DM 11.9, BLM H-1790-1 National Environmental Policy Act Handbook Appendix 4 (F-10) BLM Categorical Exclusions.

This categorical exclusion is appropriate in this situation because there are no extraordinary circumstances potentially having effects that may significantly affect the environment. The proposed action has been reviewed, and none of the extraordinary circumstances described in 516 DM 2 apply.

**Recommendation:** I have found that the proposed action is compatible with the LUP, and is an action that can be categorically excluded. The Proposed Action does not trigger any of the Extraordinary Circumstances found in 516 DM Chapter 2, Appendix 2. I recommend that the Proposed Action be allowed and that an Environmental Assessment of Environmental Impact Statement is not needed.
