## CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION

### A. BACKGROUND

**Project Name / Type:** Joe Miller Gravel (Mineral Material) Sale - 3610

#### Description of Proposed Action:

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has received a request for the purchase of up to 100 yards of gravel (mineral materials) from an existing pit at Mile 19 Edgerton Highway. This pit has been authorized by BLM to the State of Alaska, Department of Transportation (ADOT). ADOT has given concurrence for this sale of gravel.

### B. LAND USE PLAN CONFORMANCE

**Applicable Land Use Plan:** East Alaska Resource Management Plan, September 2007.

The proposed action is in conformance with plan because it is specifically provided for in the following planning decisions:

The proposed action is in conformance with the applicable land use plan, even though it is not specifically provided for, because it is clearly consistent with the following land use plan decisions (objectives, terms, and conditions):

*Page 32, J-3 Salable Minerals (Mineral Materials) – J-3-b: Management Actions. 1. Maintain current mineral material sites until material is exhausted or other circumstances warrant closure; 2. Encourage extraction of mineral materials from previously disturbed sites rather than opening new sites; 3. Do not authorize mineral material disposal from any valid existing mining claim without the consent of the claimant.*

### C. CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION

The proposed action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with United States Department of the Interior 43 CFR 46.210 or United States Department of the Interior Manual, Part 516, Chapter 11, which provides:

*F. 10. Disposal of mineral materials, such as sand, stone, gravel, pumice, pumicite, cinders, and clay, in amounts not exceeding 50,000 cubic yards or disturbing more than 5 acres, except in riparian areas.*
