A. BACKGROUND

BLM Office: Four Rivers Field Office

Lease/Serial/Case File No.: 1101644, 1101641

Proposed Action Title/Type: Mountain Home Subunit (00813) Allotment Grazing Preference Transfer

Location of Proposed Action: The Mountain Home Subunit Allotment is located approximately 35-54 miles southeast of Boise, ID (Map 1).

Description of Proposed Action: Transfer 302 Animal Unit Months (AUMs) of active grazing preference within the Mountain Home Subunit Allotment (Pasture 6) from the Rosalie S. Foster Estate (1101644) to Preston E. Lord (1101641). The Terms and Conditions of the new permit would be the same as the previous permit. Preston E. Lord has purchased the base property to which the 302 AUMs are attached from Delmar E. Foster (Surviving Spouse of Rosalie S. Foster. Per CFR 4110.2-3, Preston E. Lord has paid the appropriate fees, and submitted the appropriate documents and applications for the 302 AUMs of Grazing Preference within the Mountain Home Subunit (00813) Allotment.

B. LAND USE PLAN CONFORMANCE

Land Use Plan Name: Bruneau-Kuna Management Framework Plan and Record of Decision (MFP/ROD).

Date Approved or Amended: 3/30/1983

The proposed action is in conformance with the LUP, even though it is not specifically provided for, because it is clearly consistent with the Range Program Objectives and Recommendations within the Range Management Section of the Bruneau-Kuna MFP.

C. COMPLIANCE WITH NEPA:

The proposed action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 11.9. D. Rangeland Management

Category Description: D. Rangeland Management, 1) Approval of transfer of grazing preference. This categorical exclusion is appropriate in this situation because there are no extraordinary circumstances that would introduce potential effects that may significantly affect the environment. The proposed action has been reviewed, and none of the extraordinary circumstances described in 516 DM6 apply.

The following list of Extraordinary Circumstances (516 DM 2, Appendix 2) was considered:

1. Have significant impacts on public health or safety.

Comments/Explanation: This administrative transfer would not have any significant impacts on public health or safety. Livestock grazing is a recognized and authorized use, as identified in the MFP.

- 2. Have significant impacts on such natural resources and unique geographic characteristics as historic or cultural resources; park, recreation, or refuge lands; wilderness areas; wild or scenic rivers; national natural landmarks; sole or principal drinking water aquifers; prime farmlands; wetlands (Executive Order 11990); floodplains (Executive Order 11988); national monuments; migratory birds; or ecologically significant or critical areas, or is not in compliance with the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act.**

Comments/Explanation: The allotment supports Preliminary Priority Habitat (PPH) and Preliminary General Habitat (PGH) for greater sage-grouse, a Candidate Species for listing under the Endangered Species Act and a BLM Type 1 Special Status Species. PPH are areas that have been identified as having the highest conservation value (breeding, nesting, brood-rearing habitat) to maintaining greater sage-grouse populations. PGH are areas outside of breeding habitat that support important seasonal (winter, summer, fall habitat, migration corridors) or year-round habitat for sage-grouse. The allotment includes proposed critical habitat and occupied habitat for slickspot peppergrass (Type 1), a proposed endangered species. The Oregon Trail, a National Historic Trail, bisects the allotment. There are no other unique resources. This administrative action would not affect PPH/PGH sage-grouse habitat, slickspot peppergrass habitats, or the Oregon Trail.

- 3. Have highly controversial environmental effects or involve unresolved conflicts concerning alternative uses of available resources [NEPA Section 102(2)(E)].**

Comments/Explanation: Alternative uses of available resources are set forth in the land use plan. There would be no known unresolved conflicts as a result of the grazing preference transfer.

- 4. Have highly uncertain and potentially significant environmental effects or involve unique or unknown environmental risks.**

Comments/Explanation: An administrative action to continue an existing, managed action under identical terms and conditions would not change or increase existing effects or risks identified in the land use plan.

- 5. Establish a precedent for future actions or represent a decision in principle about future actions with potentially significant environmental effects.**

Comments/Explanation: Livestock grazing under the current terms and conditions (kind, dates, AUMs) was analyzed in the land use plan. A grazing preference transfer, without changes to the permit, is considered an administrative action. Further, the conditions for transfer of the current

grazing preference are in conformance with CFR 4110.1, 4110.2, 4110.2-3 and 4120. The transfer would not preclude subsequent changes in management.

6. Have a direct relationship to other actions with individually insignificant, but cumulatively significant environmental effects.

Comments/Explanation: A grazing preference transfer would neither add to nor detract from current grazing practices in the allotment or adjacent areas. Therefore, cumulative impacts to the area would remain unchanged.

7. Have significant impacts on properties listed or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places as determined by either the bureau or office.

Comments/Explanation: This administrative action would not impact any listed or eligible sites.

8. Have significant impacts on species listed or proposed to be listed on the List of Endangered or Threatened Species (T&E), or on designated Critical Habitat for these species.

Comments/Explanation: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) identified changes in wildfire regime (i.e., increased wildfire frequency) and invasive nonnative plants, especially cheatgrass as the primary threats to the slickspot peppergrass. Livestock grazing is not considered to pose a significant threat to the species rangewide. The proposed transfer of grazing preference would not be expected to result in adverse impacts to slickspot peppergrass because the existing permit provides adequate protection to slickspot peppergrass and its habitat.

Comments/Explanation: In addition to greater sage-grouse habitat, the allotment supports potential habitat for sagebrush steppe/grassland associated special status wildlife species. This administrative action would not affect special status wildlife species.

Comments/Explanation: Rattlesnake Creek (perennial) does not support any federally listed, candidate, or B|LM special status aquatic species.

Comments/Explanation: This administrative action would be consistent and compatible with all known Federal, State, local, and Tribal laws or requirements imposed for protection of the environment.

Comments/Explanation: There are no known low income or minority populations in the area of the proposed action. However, if low income or minority populations do exist, the transfer of existing grazing preference would not be expected to have a disproportionately high or adverse effect on these populations.


