A. BACKGROUND

BLM Office: Four Rivers Field Office, Boise District

Lease/Serial/Case File No.: 1101042

Proposed Action Title/Type: Long Gulch (00109) Allotment Grazing Preference Transfer

Location of Proposed Action: The Long Gulch Allotment is located approximately 23 miles southeast of Midvale, Idaho (Map 1).

Description of Proposed Action: Transfer 215 AUMs of active grazing preference for the Long Gulch Allotment from the historic Base Property of Record to a new Base Property held by D. Wayne Cada. The Terms and Conditions of the new permit would be consistent with the previous permits. Per CFR 4110.2-3, Wayne Cada has paid the appropriate fee and submitted an application and supportive documentation for the transfer of the 215 AUMs of active grazing preference for the Long Gulch Allotment.

B. LAND USE PLAN CONFORMANCE

Land Use Plan Name: Cascade Resource Management Plan (CRMP)

Date Approved or Amended: July 1, 1988

The proposed action is in conformance with the LUP, even though it is not specifically provided for, because it is clearly consistent with the following LUP decision(s) (objectives, terms, and conditions): Range Program Objectives and Recommendations within the Range Management Section of the CRMP.

C. COMPLIANCE WITH NEPA:

The proposed action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 11.9. D. Rangeland Management Category Description: D. Rangeland Management, 1) Approval of transfers of grazing preference. This categorical exclusion is appropriate in this situation because there are no extraordinary circumstances that would introduce potential effects that may significantly affect the environment. The proposed action has been reviewed, and none of the extraordinary circumstances described in 516 DM6 apply.

The following list of Extraordinary Circumstances (516 DM 2, Appendix 2) was considered:

1. Have significant impacts on public health or safety.

Comments/Explanation: This administrative transfer would not have any significant impacts on public health or safety. Livestock grazing is a recognized and authorized use, as identified in the Cascade RMP.

2. Have significant impacts on such natural resources and unique geographic characteristics as historic or cultural resources; park, recreation, or refuge lands; wilderness areas; wild or scenic rivers; national natural landmarks; sole or principal drinking water aquifers; prime farmlands; wetlands (Executive Order 11990); floodplains (Executive Order 11988); national monuments; migratory birds; or ecologically significant or critical areas, or is not in compliance with the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act.

Comments/Explanation: The allotment supports Preliminary General Habitat (PGH) for greater sage-grouse a Candidate Species for listing under the Endangered Species Act and a BLM Type 1 Special Status Species. PGH are areas outside of breeding habitat that support important seasonal (winter, summer, fall habitat, migration corridors) or year-round habitat for sage-grouse. There are no other unique resources. This administrative action would not affect PGH habitat.

3. Have highly controversial environmental effects or involve unresolved conflicts concerning alternative uses of available resources [NEPA Section 102(2) (E)].

Comments/Explanation: Alternative uses of available resources are set forth in the land use plan. There would be no known unresolved conflicts as a result of the transfer of the grazing preference.

4. Have highly uncertain and potentially significant environmental effects or involve unique or unknown environmental risks.

Comments/Explanation: An administrative action to continue an existing, managed action under identical terms and conditions would not change or increase existing effects or risks identified in the land use plan.

5. Establish a precedent for future actions or represent a decision in principle about future actions with potentially significant environmental effects.

Comments/Explanation: Livestock grazing under the current terms and conditions (kind, dates, AUMs) was analyzed in the land use plan. A grazing preference transfer, without changes to the permit, is considered an administrative action. Further, the conditions for transfer of the current grazing preference are in conformance with CFR 4110.1, 4110.2, 4110.2-3 and 4120. The transfer would not preclude subsequent changes in management.

6. Have a direct relationship to other actions with individually insignificant, but cumulatively significant environmental effects.

Comments/Explanation: A grazing preference transfer would neither add to nor detract from current grazing practices in the allotment or adjacent areas. Therefore, cumulative impacts to the area would remain unchanged.

Comments/Explanation: The BLM has no record of properties listed or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places in the allotment.

Comments/Explanation: No federally listed, candidate, or BLM special status plant species occur in the allotment.

Comments/Explanation: In addition to greater sage-grouse habitat, the allotment supports potential habitat for sagebrush steppe/grassland associated special status wildlife species. This administrative action would not affect special status wildlife species.

Comments/Explanation: No federally listed, candidate, or BLM special status aquatic species occur in the allotment.

Comments/Explanation: This administrative action would be consistent and compatible with all known Federal, State, local and Tribal laws or requirements imposed for protection of the environment.


