DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED ACTION

Saguache County Road and Bridge has proposed digging 12 test pits. They will be dug with a small back hoe to a depth of approximately 8 feet and a diameter of 10 feet. The first two feet of soil will be removed from each pit and separated from the remainder of the material. When the pits are filled in, the topsoil will be put into each pit last. The exploration program is to determine if there is suitable decomposed granite material. The track hoe will be transported along the road, unloaded and track from south to north, digging the pits at the coordinates listed in table 1.




Figure 1. Location of test pits

REMARKS:

Cultural Resources: Although cultural resources were found near the area of potential effect [see report 16-SLVFO-004], no sites determined to be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) were found. Therefore, the proposed project will have no impact on any historic properties (those eligible for the NRHP). If new cultural or paleontological resources are discovered during operations, all work in the vicinity of the resource will cease and the Authorized Officer with the BLM will be notified immediately. The operator shall take any additional measures requested by the BLM to protect discoveries until they can be adequately evaluated by the permitted BLM representative. Within 48 hours of the discovery, the State Historic Preservation Office and other interested consulting parties will be notified of the discovery and consultation will begin to determine an appropriate mitigation measure. BLM in cooperation with the operator will ensure that the discovery is protected from further disturbance until mitigation is completed. Operations may resume at the discovery site upon receipt of written instructions and authorization by the authorized officer.

Native American Religious Concerns: No possible traditional cultural properties were located during the cultural resources inventory (see above). There is no other known evidence that suggests the project area holds special significance for Native Americans.

Threatened and Endangered Species: This CX was prepared in accordance with the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended. Section 7 consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), in accordance with the Endangered Species Act, was not required. The Proposed Action would have no effect on any threatened, endangered, proposed, or candidate species that is listed under the Endangered Species Act. Consultation would be initiated if the Proposed Action is subsequently modified in a manner that causes an effect to a listed species or critical

habitat that was not considered in this analysis, or a new species is listed or critical habitat designated that may be affected by this action.

Migratory Birds: To be in compliance with the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and the Memorandum of Understanding between BLM and USFWS required by Executive Order 13186, BLM must avoid actions, where possible, that result in a "take" of migratory birds. Pursuant to BLM Instruction Memorandum 2008-050, to reduce impacts to Birds of Conservation Concern (BCC), no habitat disturbance (removal of vegetation such as timber, brush, or grass) is allowed during the periods of May 15 - July 15, the breeding and brood rearing season for most Colorado migratory birds.

An exception to this timing limitation will be granted if nesting surveys conducted within one week prior to vegetation-disturbing activities indicate no nesting within 30 meters (100 feet) of the area to be disturbed. Surveys shall be conducted by a qualified breeding bird surveyor between sunrise and 10:00 a.m. under favorable conditions.
