Proposed Action Title/Type: 168 Fishing Adventures Sandy River Fishing Guide Special Recreation Permit (SRP)

Location of Proposed Action: Sandy River- T. 2 S., R. 6 E., Sections 18-22; T. 2 S., R. 5 E., Sections 13 and 24, Willamette Meridian, Clackamas County

Land Use Allocation(s): General Forest Management, Congressionally Reserved, Adaptive Management Area

Description of the Proposed Action:

168 Fishing Adventures (168) has submitted a Special Recreation Permit (SRP) request to utilize the Sandy River to conduct fully guided fishing trips for native and hatchery salmon and steelhead. 168 will utilize 13 foot whitewater rafts for the guided fishing trips from the put-in location at river mile 22 near Sleepy Hallow bridge to the Marmot Dam site take-out location (See attached map). The put-in location at river mile 22 is on private land using an existing launch site which 168 has obtained permission to use. All trash and waste will be contained and disposed of properly after each trip.

168 will conduct up to ten guided fishing trips from April until August 1st with a maximum number of two participants per trip. Safety equipment for each trip will include a first aid kit, class 5 personal flotation devices, and a cell phone for emergency contact. The fishing guides responsible for the trips are certified in first aid and CPR. In case of emergency, 168 will head to the take-out site at Marmot Dam where a vehicle will always be waiting for transport.

168 will adhere to the below stipulations for their SRP. This CX, Decision Record, and SRP will be in effect until the end of the calendar year 2016. The Proposed Action will not create any new ground disturbance or generate any noise levels that would result in adverse effects to species listed under the endangered species act.

Stipulations

1. Sandy River

- Between RM 38 and RM 30 on the Sandy River, the permittee must stay within the high water mark or within the boundary of BLM-administered lands. In no way does this permit provide authorization for permit holders to access private land without written

approval.

- The permittee must provide proof of successful navigation at typical river flows before commercial activity is undertaken.
- The permittee must display a copy of the SRP during time within the Marmot Dam site; all vehicles left unattended within the site must display a copy of the SRP.
- The permittee must utilize designated parking and vehicle use areas within the Marmot Dam site, as they are developed.
- The permittee must leave the Marmot Dam site gate in the condition it was found, and maintain it in that state during and after use.

2. Risks, Hazards, Safety

- In case of human death or wildfire, involving the permitted operation, the County Sheriff shall be notified immediately, and the BLM shall be notified immediately after the Sheriff is notified.
- The permittee shall notify the BLM of any accidents involving the permitted operation which result in loss of consciousness, injury disabling individuals in excess of 24 hours, requiring medical treatment or search and rescue, or property damage in excess of \$100, and shall submit a detailed written report to the BLM within 10 days from the date of the accident. Other accidents shall be reported in the "Post Use Report".

3. Indemnification

- The permittee shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the United States and/or its agencies and representatives from any and all demands, claims, or liabilities of every nature whatsoever, including, but not limited to, damages to property, injuries to or death of persons, arising directly or indirectly from, or in any way connected with the authorized use and occupancy of the lands authorized for use under this permit.
- Insurance: Coverage shall be obtained for the permitted operations in the minimum liability coverage amounts of:
 - \$ 500,000 for any one occurrence;
 - \$ 1,000,000 per annual aggregate;
- A certificate of insurance shall be submitted, stating the limits of coverage, identifying the "United States Government" as additional insured, and that the insurer will give BLM thirty (30) days notice prior to cancellation or modification of such insurance.

4. Limitations

- This permit authorizes only temporary use in connection with the operations, during the period and in the area identified.
- Reassignment or Transfer: This permit may not be reassigned or transferred by permittee for any reason whatsoever.
- Use of Non-Public lands: This permit does not authorize use of non-BLM land (i.e. private, city, county, state, or other federal land).
- Access to Public Lands: The BLM does not guarantee legal access to public lands unless legal access for the general public is available. Where legal public access is not available, the permittee is responsible for obtaining permission from the landowner(s) to travel through or use private lands.

5. Non-Exclusive Use

- The permittee, employees and clients shall not interfere with other valid uses of public

land, including but not limited to grazing, mining, and other recreational uses by the general public or other permitted commercial operations.

- Roads, trails and trailheads, river access or campsites commonly in public use shall not be blocked or enclosed by the permittee.
- This SRP does not guarantee the permittee's sole use of public land areas, nor does it grant the exclusive use of any area.
- Public lands will generally remain available on a first-come, first served basis to other commercial and private recreational users. Nothing herein implies that the first permittee in any area has been granted exclusive use, or priority use.

6. Conduct and Manners

- The permittee is at all times responsible for the actions of themselves, their employees, and clients in connection with the authorized operations, and shall not cause a public disturbance or engage in activities which create a hazard or nuisance.

7. Modification or Amendment

- The BLM reserves the right to alter the terms, conditions, and stipulations of the SRP at any time upon notice for reasons such as changes in law, policy or administrative procedure, to prevent use conflicts, to protect public safety, or to prevent resource damage.
- The permittee shall request amendment or modification of the permit to provide for changes in: use areas or a site, season of use, services provided, fee structure, or any other changes in operations.
- The BLM may restrict use or close sites or areas on public land, or require relocation of use sites or areas to prevent use conflicts, protect public safety, or prevent resource damage.

8. Use Reports

- A Post Use Report shall be submitted annually by September 1 as well as within 30 days of the last day of use authorized, on a form provided by the BLM or an approved equivalent. The post use report shall indicate accurately the total number of clients served during the term of the Permit, total staff and total use, total receipts, and total deductions claimed, and describe any accidents or injuries that occurred, and management problems or concerns.
- Late submission of use reports may be cause for action against the permittee, including probation, suspension, and/or revocation, and criminal penalties.

9. Signing and Advertising

- Signs or advertising devices on public land require advance approval on the location, design, size, shape or color, and message.
- All advertising shall be accurate and not misrepresent in any way the services or accommodations provided, or the area authorized for use. Brochures and other advertising materials shall include the following disclosure: "Use of Public Lands under Permit by the Bureau of Land Management".

10. Resource Protection

- Aesthetics: The permittee shall protect the scenic and aesthetic values of the public lands used in the operations, and maintain premises on permitted grounds and areas to acceptable standards of repair, orderliness, and cleanliness. After use, insofar as practical,

the area shall be left in a natural state.

- **Sanitation:** The permittee will follow Leave No Trace guidelines for disposal of human waste and utilize sanitary facilities where available.
- **Trash Disposal:** All trash generated by the permitted operation shall be packed out of public land. No trash or litter shall be allowed to accumulate on the grounds. Trash shall not be buried on public land.
- **Vegetation Damage/Removal:** All operations shall be conducted in a manner which prevents damage to or loss of vegetation cover. Cutting or clearing of standing trees, alive or dead, or clearing and cutting of shrub/groundcover for any reason shall require specific advance authorization.
- **Protection of Public Property:** Signs, equipment, markers, fences, and livestock watering facilities or any other property found on public land shall not be damaged, destroyed, defaced, removed, or disturbed.
- **Cultural Resources:** Archeological and historical values including, but not limited to, petroglyphs, ruins, historic structures, and artifacts shall not be damaged, destroyed, removed or disturbed. Any hidden cultural values uncovered through authorized operations shall be left in place, and the Area Manager shall be notified of their discovery.
- **Facility Construction:** Construction of permanent facilities or improvements of any kind, including but not limited to roads, trails or structures, is not approved by this permit and shall require separate authorization.

11. Performance Evaluation

- The BLM shall conduct periodic inspections and performance evaluations of the permittee's operations and compliance with the terms, conditions and stipulations of the Permit.
- This permitted activity must conform to both the stipulations of use and the established operating plan.
- **Violations and Penalties:** Any violation of the permit terms, conditions, and stipulations may be subject to penalties prescribed in 43 CFR 8372.0-7, which may include fines up to \$1,000 and/or imprisonment up to 12 months. Additionally, any such violation may result in permit revocation, suspension or probation. Violations may also be cause for the BLM to deny approval of a Permit or Operating Authorization for subsequent years. If a permit is canceled or suspended, permit applications will not be approved for any person connected to or affiliated with the operation under a canceled or suspended permit.

II. Land Use Plan Conformance

Land Use Plan Name: *Salem District Record of Decision and Resource Management Plan*

Date Approved: March 1995

Date Amended: January 2001 by the *Record of Decision for Amendments to the Survey and Manage, Protection Buffer, and Other Mitigation Measures Standards and Guidelines*, dated January 2001 (SM/ROD) with subsequent Annual Species Reviews. These actions comply with the SM/ROD as described above and utilize the December 2003 species list. This list incorporates species changes and removals made as a result of the 2001, 2002, and 2003 Annual Species Reviews (ASR) with the exception of the red tree vole. Red tree vole in the mesic zone remains Survey and Manage Category C as defined in the SM/ROD.

The Proposed Action is in conformance with the LUP, even though it is not specifically provided for, because it is clearly consistent with the following LUP decision(s) (objectives, terms, and conditions):

1995 RMP p.41

- Provide a wide range of developed and dispersed recreation opportunities that contribute to meeting projected recreation demand within the planning area.
- Support locally sponsored tourism initiatives and community economic strategies by providing recreation projects and programs with both short and long-term benefits.
- Continue to provide non-motorized recreation opportunities (hiking, biking, etc.) and create additional opportunities where consistent with other management objectives.

III. Compliance with NEPA

The Proposed Action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 11.9 (H): “Recreation Management. Issuance of Special Recreation Permits for day use or overnight use up to 14 consecutive nights; that impacts no more than 3 staging area acres; and/or for recreational travel along roads, trails, or in areas authorized in a land use plan. This CX cannot be used for commercial boating permits along Wild and Scenic Rivers. This CX cannot be used for the establishment or issuance of Special Recreation Permits for ‘Special Area’ management.”

There is no potential for significant impacts for the following reasons:



Decision and Rationale on Action



This project will be implemented on or after approval of the Special Recreation Permit on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) administered lands.


