And I have four kids myself and, you know, the mine -- if we mine the coal, you know, you can afford to heat the house, I can afford to heat the house for my kids, I can afford to use that AC. Everybody at the same time can use that AC. We go away from that, who knows, if you turn it on, the AC might be gone. It might shut the power off like that. We'll find out, I guess, if it doesn't go the way that we hope. And charge your cars and stuff, these cars, electrical cars, you know, that comes from power. It's not just a current bush. Anyway, another thing, if we don't mine the coal, the ski resorts, you go skiing, you enjoy that, you might as well -- sad to say, let's go put windmills up. Ain't going to be able to afford to go and enjoy that anyway. You're going to be too busy with the price of the power that's going to go up, it's going to go crazy. Anyway, that's my thoughts on that. And I heard earlier today they were talking about the coal-fired power plants, the number one polluting the industry. Well, you know what? That coal-fired power plant here in Utah, it could deliver 70 percent of the power to the rest of the industries. Yeah, of course, you know, and it's not polluting more than any. It's right there with them, but, you know, they're just things to look at and I hope you take these into consideration. And thank you for letting us talk. Thank you. (Applause.)
