




Authorization of the program of work under modified Alternative C.

Opportunities for Additional Public Participation

The EA on pages 2 and 3 described the following:

"For each site-specific project involving commercial harvest treatments, the BLM at a minimum would provide an opportunity for public involvement.

The type of public involvement for each site-specific project will vary depending on site-specific circumstances, including the scope, scale, and nature of the site-specific project.

The BLM may conduct additional public notification, meetings, field trips, comment periods, or other public involvement for any site-specific project (including non-commercial projects), subject to Authorized Officer discretion."

EA and DNA Process

Integrated Vegetation Management for Resilient Lands. Approved on March 2, 2022.

On-Going Over the 10-Year Lifespan from 2022-2023

Typically planning activities such as project layout and baseline studies are started prior to the NEPA (DNA) process. This streamlining approach is also known as "frontloading".

EA

- Publish final Environmental Assessment and approved Finding of No Significant Impact and Decision Record.
- EA and Decision Record did not identify whether, when, how, or specifically where actual future treatments would occur.
- Notification to approximately 1,340 individuals, organizations and agencies on the project mailing list.
- News release published by BLM.
- Decision Record subject to administrative remedies at 43 Code of Federal Regulations Part 4.



- Evaluate potential treatment units.
- Conduct baseline studies.
- Revise potential treatment units based on results of studies.
- Initiate compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act and Endangered Species Act. This would also include notification or formal consultation with Native American tribes.

DNA

- Prepare an *unsigned* Determination of NEPA Adequacy worksheet.
- If determined necessary by the Authorized Official, conduct additional public involvement which may include a comment period on the unsigned Determination of NEPA Adequacy, may also included a virtual open house and/or site visit.

EA and DNA Process



- *IF* the Authorized Officer determines that the new Proposed Action was sufficiently analyzed in the EA, the Authorized Officer would:
- o Ensure that compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act and Endangered Species Act have been concluded including any notification or formal consultation with Native American tribes.
- OApprove the Determination of NEPA Adequacy worksheet.
- OApprove the Decision Record authorizing the new Proposed Action.
- oThe signed documents and final treatment unit maps would be published in the BLM's national "NEPA register" known as ePlanning.
- oThe Decision Record would be subject to administrative remedies at 43 Code of Federal Regulations Part 4.
- oThe new Proposed Action would be a forest management decision- the effective date of the 30-day appeal period would be the date that the approved Decision Record is posted in ePlanning.
