




Labyrinth Rims/Gemini Bridges Travel Management Plan

- Labyrinth Rims/Gemini Bridges Travel Management Area:
 - 303,994 acres of BLM-managed land
 - Includes 1,127.7 miles of travel routes





Project Overview:
The Labyrinth
Rims/Gemini

Area (TMA)



- The Travel Management Plan:
 - Designates an off-highway vehicle (OHV) travel network
 - Provides for long-term operation, monitoring and maintenance of the travel network
 - Replaces route designations from 2008 Travel Management Plan included in the 2008 Moab Resource Management Plan (RMP)
- The Draft Environmental Assessment:
 - Analyzes four alternatives for travel networks
 - Analyzes potential impacts on TMA's natural and human environment
 - Includes motorized routes and trails
 - OHV includes full-sized vehicles, UTVs, ATVs, motorcycles, e-bikes, etc.

- The purpose of revisiting the route designations within the Labyrinth Rims/Gemini Bridges TMA is to ensure routes designated in the 2008 RMP continue to meet the goals and objectives of the resources values and uses and determine if the routes still have a purpose and need.
- Bring travel management into compliance with:
 - Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance, et al. v U.S. Department of the Interior, et al. Settlement
 - OHV regulations including 43 CFR 8432.1

- Route Inventory
 - 2008 RMP travel network (OHV-open or OHV-limited)
 - Verified using field surveys, aerial imagery, internal disciplinary team input
- Route Evaluation
 - Route reports for each route or route segment
 - Available on the project's ePlanning site (Note: Large File)
 - Evaluation of resources, resource conflicts, and proposed alternatives
 - Weighed purpose and need against resource issues/conflicts
 - Assigned route designations for each alternative based on evaluations

- Four Alternatives
 - Alternatives A, B, C, and D





Miles of Evaluated Routes by Alternative and Designation

Summary of Alternatives

- Alternative A: No Action/Current Management
 - Reflects total network of evaluated routes in TMA
 - Route designations would remain unchanged
 - Baseline for comparison between alternatives
 - 1,127.7 miles available for OHV use
 - 1,056.9 miles OHV-open
 - 65.3 miles OHV-limited
 - 5.5 miles open to e-bikes (bike path)

Summary of Alternatives

- Alternative B: Natural Resource Emphasis
 - Prioritizes protection of wildlife habitat, natural and cultural resources, ecosystems, and landscapes
 - Comments received in scoping resulted in adjustment of alternative
 - 606 miles OHV-open
 - 84 miles OHV-limited
 - 75.6 miles limited by vehicle size
 - 5.5 miles open to e-bikes (bike path)
 - 437.8 miles OHV-closed
 - 52.6 miles remain open to administrative use
 - Would close some redundant route segments and address resource conflicts with Jeep Safari routes


Summary of Alternatives: Alternative B




Summary of Alternatives

- Alternative C: Multiple Use Emphasis
 - Represents balanced approach to OHV access resource protection
 - Designations accommodate natural and cultural resources; designate more miles of route than Alternative B
 - 838.7 miles OHV-open
 - 121.4 miles OHV-limited
 - 97.6 miles limited by vehicle size
 - 5.5 miles open to e-bikes (bike path)
 - 18.3 miles limited seasonally
 - 167.7 miles OHV-closed
 - 23.5 miles remain open to administrative use

Summary of Alternatives: Alternative C






Summary of Alternatives

- Alternative D: Access Emphasis
 - Allows for most OHV-based access
 - Accommodates full range of uses while mitigating travelrelated impacts
 - 974.3 miles OHV-open
 - 100.9 miles OHV-limited
 - 93.1 miles limited by vehicle size
 - 5.5 miles open to e-bikes (bike path)
 - 2.4 miles limited seasonally
 - 52.5 miles OHV-closed
 - 11.2 miles remain open to Administrative Use



The Moab BLM is undertaking a travel management plan for the Labyrinth Rims/Gemini Bridges Special Recreation Management Area. Each motorized route in the SRMA will be examined for its purpose and need as well as for the resource conflicts that it poses. The baseline (Alternative A) is the travel plan from the 2008 Moab Resource Management Plan. Three other action alternatives will be proposed. A preliminary Environmental Assessment will be offered to the public that discusses each of the four alternatives. The reasons that this area is being examined is because of a court settlement. On May 31, 2017 a settlement agreement was reached in the case titled Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance, et al. v U.S Department of the Interior, et al., This agreement has implications for travel and transportation planning efforts in the Richfield, Price, Moab, Kanab, and Vernal BLM field offices. The BLM is hosting a public comment period for the Labyrinth/Gemini Bridges Travel Management Plant from September 7, 2022 to October 7, 2022. Helpful comments are:


- Specific to the project
- Present new information
- Present reasonable alternatives
 - Example: Close roads M, O, and Y in Alternative C to prevent user conflicts between recreationists and wildlife.
 - Example: Keep road L open to provide motorists access to a favorite overlook of Z Canyon.
- Question accuracy of information
 - Example: Did the BLM use the most up-to-date data on endangered wildlife species in its analysis?
- Question adequacy of, methodology for, or assumptions used for analysis
 - Example: Question an assumption that road J has no function and provide information on the function of road J (e.g., access to an overlook).
