








Background

- The BLM Tonopah Field Office received applications for seven ROW grants to construct, operate and maintain, and decommission utility-scale photovoltaic (PV) solar facilities with energy storage systems in Esmeralda County, Nevada. The seven proposed facilities would be geographically contiguous and encompass approximately 62,300 acres of BLM-administered lands approximately 30 miles west of Tonopah, Nevada.
- The proposed solar facilities would be adjacent to the proposed corridor for NV Energy's Greenlink West 525-kilovolt (kV) transmission project. All seven facilities would connect to the proposed Esmeralda Substation.
- The BLM is preparing a programmatic-level EIS that analyzes amending the resource management plan for visual and slope management direction.
- The programmatic-level EIS would not approve any individual right-of-way grants. Rather, a site-specific analysis for individual projects would be conducted through subsequent tiered National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) documentation.

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What is the BLM's purpose and need for this project and what decisions will be made?

- The BLM's purpose for this federal action is to amend the visual and slope management direction in the Tonopah Resource Management Plan (RMP) in compliance with the Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA). The need for this action is to fulfill the BLM's responsibility under the FLPMA and the BLM's ROW regulations to manage public lands for multiple uses, including the generation and transmission of electric energy, and to consider the long-term needs of future generations for renewable and nonrenewable resources in the Tonopah RMP planning area.
- The BLM will decide whether to amend the Tonopah RMP to facilitate solar development in the planning area. If approved, the BLM would assist in addressing the management objectives in Secretarial Order 3285A1 (March 11, 2009, as amended on February 22, 2010), which established the development of environmentally responsible renewable energy as a priority for the Department of the Interior. The BLM would not approve or deny any specific proposed ROWs to construct, operate and maintain, and decommission solar-generation and storage facilities.



Range of Alternatives

• The **Proposed Action (Alternative A)** would amend the Tonopah RMP for visual resource management and slope. It also considers applications for proposed development of photovoltaic solar facilities, including solar arrays, energy storage, roads, and electric generation intertie (gen-tie) lines within seven solar rights-of-way. Assumes 5 years for full buildout of all projects and daily construction workforce of 845 personnel.

Range of Alternatives

- The Soils and Vegetation Conservation Alternative (Alternative B) would be the same as the Proposed Action, but there would be no amendment to the Tonopah RMP to change the slope requirement for the planning area to a maximum of 10 percent. Development on slopes greater than 5 percent would be based on the additional slope criteria outlined in the 2012 Solar PEIS. In addition, applicants would limit traditional construction grading methods, which remove all vegetation and compact the soil, to a maximum of 35 percent of the proposed development area. Applicants would use mowing in the rest of the development area to leave vegetation intact. In mowed areas, vegetation would be mowed to a height of 24 inches (61 centimeters) but no less than 18 inches (46 centimeters), where justified.
- Under the **No Action Alternative (Alternative C)**, the BLM would not amend the Tonopah RMP. Future development could be constrained by the existing visual resource management classifications or slope requirements.




